
people in every day life. The game is designed for anyone over nine to play and brings to life the hazards and dangers of a firefighters job.


On Wednesday 11th of December a man walked into the Kwik




CHRISTMAS WITHOUT A HOME

This Christmas, we are going to see a multitude of images flashed up on the screen depicting long queues of poorly clad, desperate and hungry people. Unfortunately this won't be another re-run of Dickens' Oliver Twist, but a news report - Christmas Eve, London, 1991.

Crisis was formed in 1967 as a short term seasonal campaign to highlight poverty in the East End of London. The first Open Christmas was established in the early 70s. Over the past few years the event has catered for up to 1,800 people each year, providing an open centre where London's homeless can either pop in or stay for the duration of the festive season.

Crisis provides basic facilities where its guests can get food, clothing, medical attention, companionship and a decent night's sleep. The charity makes no pretence to providing long term care, its aim is simply to offer homeless people some measure of comfort during the christmas period, a time of good will to all men, without discrimination. During their stay, the guests can receive medical help from volunteer doctors, dentists and even chiropodists.

We live in a society where it is tempting not to face up to problems and look the other way. There seems to be something very wrong with a society which sees thousands of people on the



streets but chooses to respond with apathy not anger, hiding behind ignorance rather then demanding initiatives.

The profile of charities has increased dramatically over the past ten years, partly as a result of an increased awareness of social problems, particularly homelessness which has escalated. Crisis aims to raise up to £2 million by the end of this year which some might consider a huge sum of money. But this has been a bad year for charities. Hit by a seemingly endless string of global disasters, it is not surprising that a recent CAP report suggested that people are giving less.

As charities struggle to cope during the recession, with its obvious effect on the amount of money that the public is prepared to give, charities such as Crisis maintain that they will have little time to consider themselves as financial victims of their own success and will continue to do as much as possible for the real victims in our society.

ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

We are becoming more aware of our environmental problems, but for those of you who are still confused, the following article should help you to understand it a bit more.

In 1985 an ozone hole was found over the Antarctic and during 1987 an International agreement 'The Montreal Protocol' failed to eliminate CFC's. In 1988 CFC's were proven to be the ozone destroyers and during 1989 United Nations scientists pointed the fingers at the them. During June 1990, 'The Montreal Protocol`

was revised. It was hoped that all ozone destroyers would be eliminated, but even today they are sold in shops.





He was a language teacher, after


gaining a degree with honours in French and German at Manchester University. After leaving Manchester he moved to Liverpool University for teacher training.

CHRISTMAS RECIPE - YULE LOG

INGREDIENTS:

1 CHOCOLATE SWISS ROLL SILVER LOG BOARD 4oz OF CHOCOLATE HOLLY, ROBIN ETC



METHOD:

1) Put the swiss roll on a board.

- 2) Put the chocolate in a basin and place over a pan of hot water, stir until chocolate has melted.
- Spread the chocolate over the swiss roll until it is completely covered, starting with the sides and then covering the ends using the back of a fork.
- Make lines in the chocolate to resemble the bark of a log.

INGREDIENTS:

2oz self raising flour;

- 1/4 level teaspoon salt;
- 1/4 level teaspoon ground cloves;
- 1/2 level teaspoon mixed spice;
- 4oz fresh breadcrumbs;
- 3oz dark brown sugar;
- 5oz currants;
- 5oz raisins;
- 4oz sultanas;
- 2oz glace cherries, chopped;
- grated rind of one small lemon;
- 2 eggs, size 3, beaten;
- 2 level tablespoons black treacle;
- 3fl oz sherry, rum or brandy;
- 2fl oz milk;
- 2-pint pudding basin, greased and lined.

METHOD:


Sift the flour, salt and spices into a bowl. Add all the remaining dry ingredients and stir well.mix together the eggs, treacle, sherry and milk. Pour into the dry ingredients, and beat with a wooden spoon. Spoon into the pudding basin and smooth level. Cover with a double layer of grease proof paper, securing it with string.


TO STEAM:

Place pudding in a steamer, standing over a large pan of boiling water and steam for 4 1/2 to 5 hours. On Christmas morning. Steam for 1 1/2 to 2 hours.
