Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parents/Carers

I am very pleased to report that we have had an extremely positive start to the school year and, not surprisingly, a very busy one.

We have welcomed a larger number of new staff than usual here mostly as a result of the seven retirements at the end of last term and we wish all our new colleagues the very best in their careers at Wath.

Year 7 students appear to have settled very quickly and have soon found their way around this very large school. My conversations with the many students I have encountered around school, in Le Rendezvous and in lessons are that they are enjoying their experience here. I have been particularly impressed by the large numbers who are involving themselves in extra-curricular activities, which we very much encourage them to do.

The sixth form has welcomed about 170 students into the new Year 12 from our ex-Y11 and many schools within the borough and beyond. Mr Naylor, Head of Sixth Form and his assistant Ms Shaw have had an extremely busy time processing the applications, interviewing prospective students and matching their course preferences.

Across our school community we continue to focus on raising academic standards and attainment and are committed to our aim to ensure that all our students receive a high quality education and leave us "active, able and qualified". This drive is unrelenting following our good Ofsted Inspection last academic year and our positive results in last Summer's external examinations.

You may recall that at the end of the Summer term the KS3 results were incomplete, as the English results were not released until late August. These have now been published and I am delighted to share with you the tremendous successes achieved by Year 9 (now Year 10).

At GCSE 50% of students have so far achieved five or more A^* - C grades but as we are awaiting the results of a number of requested re-marks this figure is likely to increase. A new statistic for publication this year is the % of students with 5 A^* - C including English and Maths which remain at 39% as last year. 97% of students achieved at least 1 A^* - G pass.

We were just a little disappointed with the baseline 50% figure but pleased with all others especially as our value added measure is a little higher than that judged by Ofsted last year indicating that students have made slightly more progress.

As always lessons can be learned. Students need to be in school every day trying their best if they are to fulfil their potential. Homework and coursework requires quality time to be spent on it and students must meet the deadlines set. Those that do persevere develop independent learning skills and cope well with the workload that public examinations demand. The demands of part-time employment and a busy social life should not push study time down their priority list. Students must accept, and act upon, the advice offered by their teachers.

We had real cause for celebration with our superb post-16 results especially at A2. We surpassed last year's record results with a 97% pass rate and 54% of passes at grades A or B. A5 results were sound and with determined efforts, promise further A2 success next year.

In our efforts to provide students with a broad range of experiences and opportunities we continue to offer a broad extra-curricular programme, which we encourage students to take part in. In our experience students who involve themselves in the wider life of the school are the most successful in every way. There will be more information about extra-curricular activities in the next newsletter.

As parents/carers you have a huge part to play in your child's success. We wish to work in partnership with you to ensure that all students take full advantage of the opportunities available and leave us 'able, active and qualified' to take their place in the adult world.

THE ROTHERHAM CHILDREN'S BOOK AWARD

The Rotherham Children's Book Award is a scheme that has involved Primary school children for a number of years now but this is the first year that Secondary Schools were allowed to participate. The scheme involved students reading a range of fiction texts, specially selected, meeting to discuss them and ultimately choosing a winner. The scheme was capped off with a fantastic visit to Magna where our students, along with Miss Piddock, Miss Marshall and some parents presented their views in front of 400 people, including the Mayor of Rotherham and some of the Authors of the novels that had been chosen.

The students had previously read the 6 books shortlisted for the award and selected one to win and one to give a presentation on. They delighted the audience with a Power Point and Drama Presentation on 'The Diamond of Drury Lane' by Julia Golding and selected 'Nickolai of the North' by Lucy Daniel Raby as their winner.

The students also made a display on 'The Diamond of Drury Lane' and had the opportunity to meet the authors and get their books signed. All of the students worked extremely hard both in the build up and on the day, even rehearsing every lunchtime for the week prior to the big event. They were a credit to the school.

Y9 ENTERPRISE CHALLENGE DAY

On Monday 16th July the whole of Y9 took part in an Enterprise Challenge Day in the school hall. The day was organised by Miss Wing, Enterprise Co-ordinator, and Joyce Tinker from Business Education South Yorkshire. This is the first of their five compulsory

days of Enterprise Education over Key Stage four.

Our students worked in groups of 7/8 to create a business that



manufactured Clown Mobiles. They had to make one of their mobiles, do all the costings, name the company, advertise it, and finally create a Power Point Presentation. They presented this in front of their tutor, and then the winning company from each tutor group did their presentation in front of the whole year group and the judges.

Throughout the day, a team of students, supervised by one of the

ICT technicians, videoed interviews from the companies that we all watched at the end of the afternoon whilst the judges made their final decisions.

INTRODUCING GEORGE FOSTER - YEAR 9

I take part in Voice and Influence, mainly at Wath Comprehensive School: A Language College but also in Roth-



erham and the North Area. One of my projects is 'Safe Havens' which has been an anti-bullying scheme for Years 7 and 8 throughout 2006-07 and this year we hope to expand this into Year 9. We have a variety of anti-bullying resources available and these include magazines, workbooks, DVD's, games etc.

During September we will be inviting applicants for the role of Team Members who will be trained before starting their role in January 2008. We are currently in the process of applying for funding for equipment which will be available for use in 'Safe Havens' and for providing a residential for the training

and team building of Team Members. We have had the continued support of Vicky Whitehead, Mrs Archer, Mr Bailey and Young People's Centre Staff throughout last year and we look forward to working with them in the coming year. Lots of changes will happen in 'Safe Havens' next year so watch out for regular updates.

One of the other roles I do is representing Wath Comprehensive School: A Language College on the Rother-ham Youth Cabinet. We have six formal meetings every year in the Council chamber at Rotherham Town Hall where we discuss and deal with issues in Rotherham affecting young people. We also have six informal meetings where we prepare agendas, do lots of group work, take part in training about issues such as Fascism and Racism and we also have people coming in to do presentations on a variety of other issues where we put forward our ideas.

I have also joined sub-groups such as Darfur (the crisis in Darfur), Quid's In (funding for young people and their projects), Bullying Strategy (ways to deal with bullying in schools) and Integrated Services (joining all organisations together like the Police, Health, Youth Service for Children and Young People in Rotherham so that they can communicate with each other and work together).

VISIT TO HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT



Riesa Work Experience




The town of Riesa in Germany welcomed four new employees at the end of last term - our Y12 German A-level students! For two weeks they worked in the local tourist information office and the town museum to get a flavour of life and language in preparation for their coursework next year.

The four students - Kate Bamforth, Charlotte Green, Kirsty McCormick and Katie Winnell - all gave up the first week of their summer holidays to complete the experience as part of their course. They stayed in the youth hostel in the Boathouse by the

River Elbe, which has played a key role in the development of the town - and still does! In 2004 the town was totally flooded after heavy rain - and our students were able to tell stories about our floods in Rotherham and Sheffield just before they left. Riesa has taken huge steps to recover from the disaster and now offers visitors a clean and compact town centre with a friendly, welcoming atmosphere.



During their stay, the Wath workers set up an exhibition in the museum, translated some tourist documents for publication and helped to produce games and activities for young visitors to the museum. One of them even paid a visit to the local hospital to check out the emergency services - and Mr





"Language College is proud of the efforts we make at Wath to help students get an experience of another country," said Mr Bemrose. "The best way to practise your language is to try to communicate with those who
