As the article opposite is on Wath Academy's victory in this year's Inter-School Sports athletics competition, we present two articles from the January 1953 issue of *The Wathonian* that report on the Inter-Schools competitions in athletics and cross-country running in 1952.

Inter-School Sports (1952)

he school showed a vast improvement in the Inter-School Sports which this year were held at Goole on July 15th.

We won the Senior Shield, were second in the Middles and second in the Juniors. Our final position was second ·also. In recent year we have been the last or next to the last and so by comparison this result was encouraging.

Three new records were broken by members of the school team and they were, incidentally, the first the school has had.

The new records are the middle relay, the senior four-forty and the senior high jump.

I think our success was due largely to better training and to the guidance of Mr. Hogg, who is to be congratulated on the result of his hard work. With a little more effort we should win outright, next year

VE DAY

This year is the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II.

ay 8th 2025 marks 80 years since the Victory in Europe Day, when the Nazis surrendered in World War II.

Winston Churchill (the prime minister at the time) announced the end of the war on the 8th May 1945 over a radio broadcast to the whole of the United Kingdom. This day marks the end of the war.

Members of the royal family made appearances at remembrance events and other things/meets to appreciate those who passed, and those who lived to tell the story.

Around twenty-one to twenty-five million soldiers passed away, and fifty to fifty-five

million civilians died – this is a total of seventy to eighty five million deaths, and VE day is so important so we can thank, remember and appreciate everyone who lost their life, or lost a loved one.

The fact all these numbers are so high, it really puts into perspective how bad the wars were, and how scary it must've been for every single person affected, and that is why days like VE Day and Remembrance Day are so important.

To celebrate the national holiday in 1945, people hosted parties (specifically street parties) and there was a lot of dancing and singing.


eadowhall opened on 4th September 1990. Meadowhall is in Sheffield and is one of the UK's biggest shopping centres.

From awkward performances to subpar CGI, this film struggles to capture the magic of the original classic.




