# **English Baccalaureate**

This new award introduced by the Government will become a key figure in school league tables. To gain the Baccalaureate a student needs GCSE Grades C or above in English Language, Maths, Science, a Modern (or ancient) Foreign Language, and a Humanities subject.

As a specialist Language College, our students have an advantage over others in Rotherham and are more likely to leave school with the Baccalaureate because we require all our students to study a foreign language (although we also offer NVQs in French, German and Spanish). If the award had been offered last year, 25% of our students would have achieved it, against a national average of 16%. This year, our target is for 30% of Wath Comprehensive School students to leave school with the Baccalaureate.

Given that many schools do not require students to study a foreign language, nationally, a very small number of students are expected be awarded the Baccalaureate, with well over half of all University applicants not getting it. We therefore expect that the Baccalaureate will become an important goal and that many of our students will be motivated to achieve it.

## Language Classes

Our language classes for adults started again in September. We're running 30-week tutor-taught classes in Beginners' & Intermediate French & Spanish. We're also starting another 10-week computer-based course in January. We offer 32 languages from Arabic to Icelandic, Spanish to Welsh on our computer-based courses. # The Go For It! Scheme

The Go For It! Scheme is a national initiative designed to help more young people take part in out of school activities. The scheme is now in its second year and we hope it will be even more popular this year than last!

Eligible students can apply for funding to allow them to participate in out of school (after school, weekend and holiday) activities such as Scouts, music lessons, sports or drama clubs, beauty courses, teen gym, street dance and even driving lessons. The Go For It! Scheme has also helped to heavily subsidise a number of extra-curricular activities which we opened up to all students in school including paintballing, skateboard customising, nail art, cupcake baking, graffiti art and more.

If you are eligible for Go For It! funding, you will have received a letter from Rotherham Council's Children's and Young People's Department explaining the scheme. If you would like to take part in an activity, please ask your parent or carer to complete the Activity Request Form and then you need to bring it back to Miss Owen in the Language College Office (next to G7).
