Comic Relief - It's back!

It's back in big style! What am I talking about?, well Comic Relief!. Once every two years the whole country goes mad, literally. This year's Red Nose Day will be the sixth since 1985, when comic Lenny Henry began the charity after a television broadcast from a refugee camp in Sudan, in the Middle East.

Charities

So far, over £112 million has been raised and every penny goes to charities in the UK and Africa. Around 2,885 projects in the UK are funded by Comic Relief, many help the young like Gyroscopie in Hull. It was started in 1985 by a group of young people concerned with the growing amount of young homeless people in Hull. They renovated a building and learned new skills in the process, since then they have repeated the process and now house 45 young adults (who they now employ) and 18 children.

There are other projects that help drug and alcohol abusers, the elderly and the disabled, of course there are many others that this worthwhile charity has helped.

Water

In Africa, the money pays for water pumps to provide fresh water for villages, clothes, food and medical supplies and tools and equipment. All of these can help give people a chance to live and see how much life can be enjoyed.

In an interview with Tony

Robinson this week, he said that the sight that gave him most satisfaction was that of a child in Africa, brought back to life by a packet of medicine that cost only 20p!. Tony, who became involved with Comic Relief through the writer of Blackadder and Four Weddings and a Funeral, Richard Curtis, has been on many trips for Comic Relief to report back to the public. They include Malawi, to look at refugee camps, Tangania, to see

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why people are so poor and Uganda, to a village where a third of the people are HIV positive. If given his one wish, he would want the world trade agreements to allow farmers in developing countries to sell their produce to the West at fair prices, as at the moment these farmers are being ripped off!.

Tonight

On BBC1 starting at 7pm, Lenny Henry will open the six hours of fun and mad tv fund raising continuing on through the night. With specials like the teaming up



of The Vicar of Dibley and Ballykissangel and one Comic Relief themed episode of Men Behaving Badly! But of course we can't forget the traditional slot of French and Saunders!, and included with this section of comedy are the lovely Sugarlumps performing the number one single Who Do You Think You Are?, with the SPICE GIRLS. One to watch!!!!

Closer to home, we at school are doing our bit for Comic Relief. Several events are happening, like the Uniform Free Day (organized by Mrs Whiting), where pupils pay 50p towards Comic Relief for the day. Madman Shoots Dead Seven Israeli School Girls

Last night a Jordanian soldier horrifically shot dead 7 innocent children on a school field trip. He opened fire when the girls had turned away from him before colleagues overpowered him.

King Hussein is blamed by Israeli ministers for provoking this attack.

All five children aged; 12 and 13 died in a Jordanian hospital.

Their funerals are expected to generate an outburst of grief from the nation. One 14 year old survivor said, "The girls screamed and cried.....Many girls were hurt and bloody."


This tragedy falls heavily on the heels of the anniversary of the Dunblane massacre.






BILLY-JOE FOSTER FATHER RE-ARRESTED

39 year old Sion Jenkins was re-arrested last night for the murder of his foster daughter Billy-Joe.

Billy-Joe was battered to death with an 18 inch tent spike at their home in Hasings on the 15th of february. She was fostered 5 years ago by Jenkins and his wife lois 35.

Jenkins has already got 4 daughters who he has been living apart from.

Police obtained a magistrates warrant allowing only 36 hours to question Jenkins.

Jenkins a well educated Deputy Headmaster was considered a pillar of the community.

After Billy-Joe's death Jenkins made a T.V. appeal. The spike used to kill her was left on a garden table nearby.

Two other men were arrested earlier in the murder hunt but both were released with Police bail.

Herr Kohl, who is the longest serving German chancellor ever, has had a difficult run over the past year, with unemployment running at over 12% and the government having to make cuts in public spending in order to qualify for the European Single Currency (the Euro) by 1999.

Although his party is still strong in opinion polls, Kohl, who looked invincible in the past, is increasingly under threat from a ferocious opposition and an increasingly unsympathetic public.

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A One Horse Race?

As the General Election approaches, it looks like a foregone conclusion: Labour by a mile than a short head! In our part of the world, that is what we expect: there is only one Tory seat in the whole of South Yorkshire, and huge Labour majorities are normal. In Barnsley East, for example, which includes a large part of the Dearne Valley, Labour had a staggering 77% of the vote at the last election in 1992.

This election will be rather different in the Wentworth

constituency, which includes Wath, Swinton and Brampton. Peter Hardy, who has been in the House of Commons since 1970 is standing down, and defending his 22,449 majority will be TUC researcher Alan Healey, and if, as seems certain, he becomes the new M.P. for our area, we shall be welcoming him to our school very soon.

Perhaps, even sooner than that! As usual we shall have a "mock" election in school shortly before the real thing, and everyone will have a vote. Candidates will be chosen just after Easter and 'our'

election will be in full swing by mid-April. The Wentworth will be invited in to put their parties' views. Watch out for more news of this.

What of the rest of the country? Most people will be very surprised if they do not wake up to a Labour government (Presumably on May2!) Perhaps the main reason is that the country has become bored of the Conservatives, who have been in government since 1979. No one of school age can remember a Labour government, and you would have to have been over 40 to have

been voted for one! Labour would be a novelty, no doubt! The Tories have won 4 times in a row, but a 5th victory seems most unlikely; no party so far behind the opinion polls for so long has caught up by polling day, and the government last held a seat in a by-election in 1989 - and that was old Wathonian William Hague at Richmond.

'May Day' is the international distress signal. How appropriate for Mr Major!

9. Eat and sleep well.

10. Be carefull to work on all subjects not just the ones that you like and are good at. It is so easy to ignore the really boring bits

but they usually crop up in exams.

11. Stop and take a break if your mind starts drifting.
12. Don't panic or worry, just do your best.

I am 15 and I know that revising is a hassle and is usually a lot harder than earning the work in the first place and a lot of pupils feel that they are facing an up hill battle alone, but they are not, There will always be someone there to help be it a friend, relative or teacher. THE MILLENNIUM EARTH CENTRE

The Earth Centre in Donisbrough, South Yorkshire, has received a grant of £50 million from the Millennium commission of the National Lottery.

The Earth Centre is one of the first two national landmarks projects to receive funds from the Millennium commission, which on the 2nd of October 1995 announced it's second grant award's totaling £109 million. The other successful landmark project is the Renaissance of Portsmouth Harbour, which has been awarded £40 million towards an £86 million maritime leisure development.

Millennium Commission Chairman, The Rt.Hon.Virginia Bottomley JP, MP,said : " We are delighted to support a Landmark Project of potentially international significance - a world class centre for sustainable development in the 21st century and a focus for the public's increasing awareness of enviromental issues.

" On completion, The earth Centre will be the largest public education complex in the U.K since the great Victorian museums of South Kensington. This ambitious and inovative scheme will break new ground in environmentally - friendly


development and will give the Dearne Valley in South Yorkshire a tremendous regenerative boost."

It is estimated that the £ 125 milli on visitor centre and state-of-the-art science complex on a 142-hectare former collirey site will attract over 2.5million visitors a year in the year 2000. The concept of The Earth Centre was born from a report of the World Commission on Environment and Development which preceded the Rio Earth Summit, where a urgent call was made for "vast campaigns of education, debateand public participation."

The prevailing government ploy of offering tax





THE LABOUR mouse is banking on running up the privatised utilities clock with the windfall tax, but if the markets strike one then this Labour rose could find itself uprooted before it has had chance to bloom.



Blair's party may well be able to sail away in a beautiful pea-green royal yacht, but whether they can take plenty of money with them, having pledged to adhere to Tory spending ceilings, is far from beyond doubt. While New Labour may be able to pacify industry with the oranges and lemons of a tough stance against the trade unions, the belles of industry will not remain silent for long if their five farthings begin to depreciate in value.



Although Paocoy and Tony may be going up the hill of constitutional reform together, the Labour Party, a paler shade of European blue than their liberal colleagues, may cause both to come tumbling back down.

As for the timebomb of the millennium project, if the wolves of spending cuts and inter-party wrangling began to blow at the Greenwich dome, the whole house could fall down.

There seem to remain only inacey wincey differences between the two major parties in many areas, and the voter could well find himself either falling prey to the pre-election spider's of political gimmicks and sound-bites before taking the one, two steps into the voting booth.

The determining factor in a few weeks time could turn out to be that however menacing the labour ogre

under the bridge may seem to be, for the majority of voters, after eighteen years the grass is definitely greener on the other side of the fence.

COMMONS REPORT CONDEMNS VOUCHER SCHEME

The Government's nursery voucher scheme is unlikely to increase parental choice raise standards or provide more places, says a Commons Select Committee. The Education and Employment Select Committee's conclusions have been leaked a week ahead of schedule. It believes the scheme may benefit some nursery schools at the expense of voluntary playgroups.

Some Tory MPs say the report is blatant electioneering by Opposition parties.

FRENCH OIL PLATFORM SEIZED OFF NIGERIA

The French embassy in Nigeria is in contact with the local authorities following the seizure of an oil platform in the Warri region. The platform was seized in shallow waters and 16 French citizens and three others possibly Britons are being held on board.

Its owners ETPM operate a number of off-shore drilling platforms.

It is assumed that those occupying the platform will demand a ransom.

MURDERER EXECUTED BY LETHAL INJECTION

Texas death row inmate John Kennedy Barefield, 32, has been put to death by lethal injection.

He was sentenced to death for the abduction, rape and murder of an architecture student.

His execution at Huntsville was the second in Texas this year and the 109th since the state restored the death penalty in December 1982.

Barefield's last words to his brother were: "Tell mother I love her."

WRECK OF ELIZABETHAN SHIP IDENTIFIED

Archeologists claim to have finally identified the wreck of an Elizabethan ship found some years ago.

The wreck was found off Alderney, one of the Channel Islands.

With the help of the BBC2 programme Horizon it was classified as a fast cargo ship taking supplies to British

forces in Normandy 400 years ago.

The find has been described as second only in importance to the discovery of Henry VIII's flagship, the Mary Rose.

NHS RED TAPE CUTS SAVE £340m DORRELL

Cuts in Government spending on NHS red tape will release £340m for patient care, claims Stephen Dorrell.

In 1997-98 cuts are expected to match the overall efficiency target of 2.7%.

This means management spending will have fallen by £1 86m 10% in real terms in the two years to the end of 1997-98, according to Mr Dorrell.

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DORRELL RELEASES VOUCHER SCHEME FOR ELDERLY

Stephen Dorrell released a scheme so elderly people could pay for private residential care. The new vouchers would be offered to the elderly to help pay for care under the biggest shake-up of Social Services for 25 years.

Mr Dorrell outlined a gigantic sell-off of old peoples homes generating more than £1 billion thus extending nursery vouchers to the elderly

If the Conservatives are re-elected every elderly person with assets of less than £10,000 would be eligible for the vouchers

The vouchers would cover the cost of nursing or residential care after an assessment of their needs Those with larger assets would get vouchers covering part of the costs

A White Paper on show for the first time yesterday shows that the government are ready to demolish any legal obstacle in the way of an extension of the scheme

Under proposals in the White Paper 2,500 elderly peoples homes run by the council would be sold or closed affecting up to 76,000 people

Mr Dorrell believes that the privatisation of the homes will add to an already good service


The government have decided not to privatise

childrens homes due to the abuse scandals that have come to light in recent years

By averting the elderly and disabled towards voluntary carers, Social Services would concentrate on spending more money on the frail, disabled, drug addicts, and alcoholics.

With the Social Service reform bill, local authorities would have to sell or close their elderly peoples homes unless there is a valid reason why they ought to be kept open

A survey ordered by Stephen Dorrell found that homes were £50 per resident more expensive to run than the private owned



Homes at £280 per week in 1994-95. The savings ought to be sufficient to buy an extra 10,000 places for elderly people in care homes


Mr Horton also said "William had to be very discrete but now Ffion has taken a sabbatical and the news can come out, I think that is the right way of doing things."

On a recent Wednesday night, at the Pheasant in Sheffield, around two hundred people gathered with a mix of anticipation and, in my case at least, anxiousness. We were about to see a concert by The Hamsters, and whilst I'd been told they were exceptionally good, they're also exceptionally loud. We weren't disappointed.

The band are a three piece (base, drums, guitar and vocals) Blues - rock group with the guitarist providing surprisingly good vocals for someone who was swigging from a medicine bottle between songs. They played a variety of stuff including Jimi Hendrix and ZZ Top covers. They certainly ended the night with a bang and not a pzzzt.

And so it was with numbed and ringing ears, and slight concern about whether I'd ever hear anything again, I left The Pheasant feeling I'd got my money's worth.

Radio Ga? Ga?

We were greeted by Jane Kitson, a sports presenter for the station, and she duly gave us a tour. This included visiting a recording studio and seeing how interviews are recorded and edited on computer and how it used to be done on a reel to reel tape recorder. Editing on computer is a lot easier than doing it with tape, you can replay things instantly and see exactly where you are. When editing reel to reel tape you have to mark where you want to start and stop - editing bits out by literally cutting them out with a razor blade! We also saw how jingles are played and saw Tony Capstick's chair!! (hold on to your hats there's more to come).

News from London is faxed to the building in the same room as the

journalist's computers and is also sent as a broadcast, which is taped. There are independent firms which employ people to sit in courts all day to find out what's happening and then sell their information to the Media. The building also includes a small television studio, which is big enough for one person. This allows presenters in the main studio interview people who aren't actually with them by having them in Radio Sheffield's studio.

A few minutes after this we found ourselves in a room with half a dozen press releases, writing (or trying to write) a newsbulletin. We had listened to a selection of broadcasts, all from the same day, by different stations. This allowed us to see the importance they gave to each news item, both by its length and the running order, which changed considerably for each station depending on the audience they expect to attract. We had to chose a press release each and from it write part of the broadcast. This basically meant editing bits of it out and making it easier to say: changing words which were difficult to pronounce and making sure that sentences weren't too long and had suitable punctuation.

The next step was to sort out the running order, deciding whether Oasis

Jane Kitson obviously enjoys her job and has worked in radio since she was sixteen. It seems to be a job which you have to love, but this visit was a worthwhile experience. Oh, and by the way, apparently I've got to mention that you've got to listen to Radio Sheffield, so er... listen to Radio Sheffield.

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

RADIO CONTROL FREAK!

When you take controls of an R.C car you just switch off from every thing else the buzz is phenomenal. The good thing about this particular hobby is that you can spend the amount of money you wish to spend on it anything from £250 to to £4000. The basic things that you need are a car (this comes in kit form but more about that later); a radio, some fuel and a glow plug.

THE CAR

This comes as a kit and PREVIOUS CAR BUILDING OR ENGINEERING IS RECOMMENDED but the basic thing you need is patience. I own two cars a Schumacer Club ten electric and a Panda monster truck with a size ten engine and the Club Ten was definatley much easier to build but do not be put off they are not hard to build they cost about £160. 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
Have a read.



Who fancies racing around a flat piece of tarmac on a piece of metal with four wheels and an engine, or, if you would prefer it, "Karting". Avago Karting is an indoor Karting track in Swinton on Whitlea Road. Simply turn up, pay your money and drive! For £3.50, on a weekday before 6:00pm, you can give the karts a good thrashing in a 5 lap practice followed by a 10 lap race. Another of the exciting things was skidding around the corners. Putting in as much power on as I could into the corner and just doing a skid round. Exciting? I got a kick every time I did one. The second time I went the excitement was the overtaking. I had all my sights set on overtaking someone, as there were some people who had never been before. Over taking plus skidding round a corner or accelerating down the straight is just the ultimate. I really enjoyed my Karting experience and hope to go again in future. My advice to you is get down there and "AV A GO".

Unlike the beginner I was completely prepared as I marched in with my full race suit, helmet, gloves and driving boots, as I have had 3 years previous experience at

various other tracks. The track looked good, so did the karts, powered by one Honda GX160cc engine, which seemed to have enough power for the short twisty circuit. The track was pretty challenging, but once you had learnt it, it seemed rather easy, but they are going to change it every month which should make things interesting. The real enjoyment for myself was to demoralise the opposition by beating them by at least five laps. This is because I really like to win. It seems to give me great pleasure whoever I win (even if some of the opposition are complete novices). I always strive to get the best out of my Kart. To do this I must enter the corner in a slide by jamming on the brakes and turning the steering sharply. I must exit, still in a full drift (sliding), but straightening out as I exit, and applying full throttle throughout this manoeuvre. You won't be able to do this straight away, but if you keep practising for eighteen months you will do it automatically. They may be starting a race school soon, so go along to that if you're interested.

It requires its players to be very fit. There is a lot of running to do. With only ten players on court at any one time you get a lot of possession. It is not a specialist sport like football. There is no clear-cut defence or attack. Everyone does both.

Basketball now has a full professional league in England with teams like the Doncaster Panthers and the Sheffield Sharks based in South Yorkshire.

On a more amateur level to get you started, you could always go to the practices at 12:45pm on Wednesdays in the sports hall run by a group of sixth formers.

A basketball club is also run on Saturday mornings at Darfield Foulstone High School by Mr. Bert Beaumont and Mr. Dave Markham. The training sessions run from 9:00am to 11:30am for years 7 and 8 and from 11:30am to 2:00pm for years 9, 10 and 11. There is also a session for junior school kids from 9:00am to 11:30pm. It costs 50p and there are refreshments on sale. Also on sale are cut price pairs of basketball

boots, and Barnsley basketball T-shirts.

All you need to bring is a T-shirt and pair of shorts (or jogging bottoms if it's cold), a pair of trainers and 50p. Comet.

A comet called "Hale-Bopp" is currently in view in the northern sky. It is a brilliant astronomical spectacle and will be visible in all it's glory for the next month or so. It will not set again until the early hours of Wednesday 16th of April. During this time period it will vary in magnitude (brightness) from 0.5 to 0.6, meaning that it will outshine some of the dimmer stars. During this time period the comet's distance from Earth will be about 200-300 million km which is a lot further away from earth than the sun. The best time to see the comet will be from about 9:00pm in the evening until about 5:00am in the morning. Don't miss it. Astronomers say this will be "the best comet of the century." It will not return to view for another three thousand years.


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Bald future for Beauty Queen

She has shown an astonishing will to live and survive. She left the hospital with a shaven head and the scars from the surgery with no attempt to cover them up.

How many celebrities can you think of that would show the courage and bravery of Liz when she has suffered from so much agony in her life. She was born in 1932 with an imperfectly formed spine, condemning her to a lifetime of back pain. While she was filming Lassie in 1934, her foot was crushed by a horse. During the filming of National Velvet in 1944, a riding accident crushed a disc. She almost lost her sight in 1953 when a stone was thrown in to it. She fell on stairs in 1956 while on a cruise, which meant she had to have an operation to transfer bone from her pelvis to the spine. In 1959

she was admitted to hospital twice for a throat operation and pneumonia. In 1961, she had another pneumonia emergency, she had a tracheotomy and at one stage was pronounced dead. In 1975, she was put in to traction after a spinal operation. A double dose of trouble happened in 1976 after she fell from a horse and later from a motor

car crash in 1982 which caused neck and leg injuries. She collapsed in 1988 after compression fracture of vertebra which reduced her to wheelchair access. In 1990 she was close to death again through pneumonia and pleurisy.

She had a hip replacement in 1994 because of Chronic osteo-arthritis followed by a hip operation in 1995 and now finally, the removal of a brain tumor. For Liz however, life must go on and she is determined to carry on with normal life but to take it easy at the same time.




New Craze Hits Japan!



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EXPEDITION TO THE ARCTIC

This year, last month, two experienced British explorers set off on a two leg Arctic Expedition. They started from the Arctic Cape on the 5th of February and they aim to reach Ward Hunt island on June 5th. But before the expedition can even start the men had to train. This training took seven months from August 1996 to February 1997 just before the expedition set off. This training took place in the Lake District where the team also co-ordinated the preparation of the equipment. In mid February the team set off for their exciting journey. This was only a plane flight to Moscow to meet the film crew but in some way in symbolised the beginning of this long and tiring expedition. The

'Fracture Zone' the doctor and business partner will have to travel another 430 nautical miles. This will take the team across broken terrain until they reach the North Pole. A few of the obstacles faced will be 'leads' these are areas of water where the pans of ice have broken. To overcome this problem the team have decided to make a rafting system with their sledges. The 'leads' are crossed instead of circumnavigated. The team is going to take advantage of all the natural things. For instance the team are going to take advantage of the prevailing winds. They will do this by using two parawings to pull themselves and their sledges across the open sections of the ice. The parawings act like plane wings when they are filled

because of quite a few factors. For a start the load will be getting lighter all the time, another helpful thing will be that the sun, instead of being out for just four hours will be out all the time. This is of course the Midnight Sun. Another benefit will be The Transpolar Driftstream which will assist the team up to 8 miles a day. However, the team does have one final obstacle in their way. This is the final 60 miles when they must cross the 'pressure ridges'. These are barriers of ice created when the current of ice smashed against the coast of Greenland and other similar countries. I think the team should be able to complete this task quite easily. In June this year the expedition will hopefully come to an end. This will be after approximately 100 days and after the team has covered approximately 936 nautical miles. When the team do reach Ward Hunt Island there's sure to be some welcome! The only other thing I can say is good luck to the team!

team was then flown out to Severnaya Zemlya to set up a small camp. The first proper leg of this journey will take Dr. Stephen Martin and David Mitchell from the Arctic Cape to the North Pole. This leg is estimated to take until May. Over the first 50 to 100 nautical miles the men will cross over an area called the 'Fracture Zone'. This is an area of thin ice where the Polar Ice Caps meet land. The area is very cold with temperatures as low as minus 40C and that's in the day time! Another hindrance, is at the start of the expedition, there will only be four hours of daylight. After they have past the

The team should reach the North Pole after about 70 days of travelling. In this time the team will have covered a total of approximately 518 nautical miles. You would have thought that this was a pretty good achievement but the two Brits will then plod on with the second leg of their journey. The second leg of their journey will take the team to Ward Hunt Island. This will again be roughly 418 nautical miles long. However the pair expect this to be a much easier leg

F1 REVIEWS

The F1 World Championships started in earnest this month with the Australian Grand Prix. After a shock win for McLaren and both the Williams' crashing out, what for the rest of the season?

The Disappointments of Melbourne

Four teams were very disappointing: Benetton, Jordan, Williams and Arrows. Benetton, at the top of our list of failures were very bad in qualifying and also in the race itself, with one retirement and a 4th place finish. They showed speed and promise in pre-season tests but all this went out of the window in Australia.

Jordan also promised much with their pre-season tests, claiming that they had found 20% more downforce on their cars which they said was worth about two more seconds a lap. This should have put them right at the front challenging with Williams in qualifying, but lowly grid positions were the norm. Both cars retired in the race.

The two Williams had a brilliant qualifying session with both cars on the front row of the grid. The race though was an anti-climax with Villeneuve going out on the first corner, Frenzen losing the lead through a bad second pitstop and then having to retire through an exploded brake disk.

Arrows were a little disappointing starting on the last row of the grid after Damon Hill was fairly confident about qualifying in the top ten. This high grid position was wishful thinking as he ended up only just qualifying in 20th position. His team mate, Pedro Diniz, had to put in an appeal to get into the race when he didn't make the 107% qualifying group. The race was even worse as Hill didn't even make round the parade lap. An electronic throttle failure

meant he couldn't start the race.

The Surprises of Melbourne

Some of the more mediocre teams were quite surprising: McLaren, Ferrari and Sauber. McLaren were the sensation of the race. David Coulthard took his first win for McLaren and his first since 1995. Mika Hakkinen took third place for an eight point lead for McLaren in the Constructors Championship.

M. Schumacher has played down the performance of his Ferrari but from 3rd place on the grid he grabbed the second place spot with Frenzen crashing out, even though he had to do a short third stop for fuel. Eddie Irvine was impressive in qualifying, but he retired early in the race after a clash with Villeneuve.

Sauber, with last years Ferrari engine, were amazing in qualifying with Johnny Herbert 5th on the grid until the last two minutes when he was

pushed down to 7th. Nicola Larini was not so impressive in qualifying but he scraped a point out of the race. Johnny Herbert had an super start in the race, up to 3rd from 7th, but it all ended on the first corner when he tangled with Villeneuve. This was a especially good race as the Sauber was late to be launched so little testing had been done.


Minardi qualified and finished 9th in the race!!!! Pedro Diniz finished in the off-the-pace Arrows!!!!


REDFEARN IS DOUBLE TROUBLE!!
