#### ADULT EDUCATION LANGUAGE CLASSES

Do you know that the Language College opens its doors to the community every Thursday evening during term time?

As a Specialist Language College we offer adult education courses in beginners and intermediate French and Spanish. These courses have been running for a good number of years and prove extremely popular.

The courses are now well underway for this year. They run from mid September right through the school year usually ending in June or early July.

#### FIRST STEP LANGUAGE LEARNING

The Language College also offers "First Step" Language Learning courses each Thursday afternoon from 3:30 to 5:00 pm. There are 25 different languages to choose from including Korean, Swedish, Japanese, Swahili, and Turkish.

These are network language learning courses [supported by the Learning Skills Council] which allow learners to work at their own pace with a tutor for guidance.

Past students have said:




## GOVERNORS AT WATH - LONG SERVICE AWARDS



## LOOKING BEYOND OUR SHORES

The Language College has once again been recognised for its international collaboration work at the YHLGA gala dinner in Leeds last week. The Riesa English Language Pilot project was organised and supported by the Rotherham Chief Executive's Office but devised and delivered by Mr Bemrose at school.

Riesa is Rotherham's Partner Town in what used to be East Germany, near the major city of Dresden. A business delegation came to Rotherham last year and asked about an English Language learning experience at the Language College in February. They came back at half-term, and Rotherham provided the experience, while Mr Bemrose provided the Language. As part of the deal, our Y12 students were able to complete a work placement in Riesa last summer - see In Touch issue September 2007.






This collaboration between the two towns and the Language College was just what was required for the award entry. The judges were convinced that in "Looking Beyond Our Shores" the Language College was trying to develop successful partnerships for the benefit of everyone. Rotherham was awarded the third place certificate by Claire Frisby of BBC's Look North Breakfast programme. Mr Bemrose was pleased with the result. "It's the first year we've linked up with Riesa, so I think we've done very well," he said. "There will be a second course next February, and we hope to build on the contacts in the future."

# <u>Year 9 and 10 History Trip To The</u> <u>Imperial War Museum In</u> Manchester

On the 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> December Year 9 and 10 students visited the Imperial War Museum in Salford, accompanied by Mr Kolaric, Mrs Champlin, Mrs Eyre, Mr Staton, Miss Cooney and Miss Whitehead who all did a fantastic job of keeping us in line. We encountered many different types of displays which had various smells (nasty ones that smelt like sweaty feet and mustard powder) and hands on activities and others for the senses. There were many interesting and factual exhibits.

The order was from the start of World War One through World War Two and the Cold War, right through to the present day. They were presented in a timeline of events. As we arrived, a 3D slide show began, showing us war from the perspective of children. The other 3D shows were on the role of women and military weapons and machinery.



The exhibits were very informative and were presented clearly. There were vast amounts of memorabilia from the wars. An interesting piece was a Mickey Mouse edition gas mask for children. There were also uniforms that nurses and pilots used to wear.

A World War Two truck hung from the ceiling as well as a Triumph motorbike and a variety of cars. A fire engine used in the war was also on display. There were also weapons such as hand guns, rifles, hand grenades, bayonets and unexploded bombs, as well as a metal air raid shelter. There was also a large amount of propaganda, either persuading men or women to help the war effort or to join the Army, Navy or RAF.

Another interesting exhibition was the rationing display. This is because there were various rationing books and records. The other exhibitions included the role of women, air raid shelters, the blitz, blackouts and evacuation. There was also an extensive display on animals in war.

All in all, it was a great factual and learning experience and is definitely a trip to recommend!
