Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parent / Carer,

As the end of the school year is almost upon us, it is an appropriate time to reflect on our achievements this year. We are, of course, proud of all of our students' achievements and throughout the year the concerts, Movement Evening, dance shows, drama productions, sports successes, Sports Awards Evening and DofE expeditions have given us the opportunity to celebrate the wealth of talent of our students, as evidenced in the recent end of year Celebration Assemblies. In the recent Rotherham Young Musician of the Year competition, Sienna Thorpe played extremely well and Kirin Howat came 2nd. These are great achievements considering that they were competing against students up to 18 years of age.

With regards to summer sports, we have generally had a good season, competing in Rotherham Schools and English Schools athletics events across Years 7-10. We have averaged around 60 students per event, by far the best in Rotherham. There were notable successes with us retaining the prestigious Inter-Schools competition against Wickersley, Dinnington and Maltby at the Keepmoat Stadium, Doncaster and the Year 7/8 boys qualified for the regional English Schools cup and finished a creditable 3rd against mainly private schools. There were also individual successes with 38 Rotherham Championship medallists (15 golds, 10 silvers and 13 bronze). We also had 19 students selected to represent Rotherham schools at the South Yorkshire Championships: the second best in Rotherham. As a result of this, Kristie Archer (Year 10) and Billie-Jo Harris (Year 13) qualified for the English schools final.

In rounders, the highlight was our Y7 squad finishing as runners-up in the Rotherham finals while our mixed rounders squad made it through to the regional rounds and recently played in Leicester, representing the school with credit. At cricket, all 4 teams (Years 7-10) have enjoyed success this year. We have strong numbers and a really good Wath team ethos throughout, with all teams playing with great sportsmanship and enjoying taking part. All teams have won more games than they have lost; unfortunately 3 of the teams lost in the semi-final of the Rotherham Cup to strong opponents, however, our Year 9s made it to the final by winning 3 cup games.

In terms of individual successes - Luke Breedon (Year 7) is the South Yorkshire ball throw champion and new South Yorkshire record holder, Kristie Archer is the South Yorkshire long jump champion and qualified for the National Championships and Billie-Jo Harris also qualified for the National Athletics Championships.

The last few weeks of term have been very busy and the recent Year 11 and Year 13 Proms are certainly among the highlights of the year. Both were a huge success, enjoyed by students and the many staff who attended.

As always, the end of year brings some sadness as we say goodbye to staff who are leaving to take up new posts elsewhere, for promotion or relocation, and also to pursue other avenues. I would like to take this opportunity to thank

them all for the positive contributions they have made to Wath Comprehensive School and wish them every success in the future. In particular, Mr Riddle and Mr Lowiss are retiring from Science, as Head of Chemistry and Head of Physics respectively, and Mr Powell is retiring as Deputy Headteacher and teacher of Economics. We very much appreciate all they have done for the school and wish them well for their future interests.

I would also like to pay tribute to Irene Hartley MBE, who is retiring after 35 years on the Governing Body of the school, the last 32 of which she has been Chair of Governors. This amount of voluntary service is exceptional and her calm but determined eye will certainly be missed; however, I know she will remain a keen supporter of the school.

Of course, none of the extra activities in the school could occur without a very committed group of staff. We are working very hard to implement improvement plans to ensure every student makes the maximum possible amount of progress. We have a governing body who remain absolutely committed to our students having the very best educational experience. We are already looking forward to making even further improvements in our external examination results this summer. I am very proud to be working with such a committed group of people and I am confident that the school will continue to develop and continue to enjoy success in the years to come.

As we fast approach the summer holiday, the school is looking forward to joining the Maltby Learning Trust next academic year and continuing the exciting journey of improvement, committing to many new ways of working both inside and outside the classroom.

Next year, we will see a change to the school day, moving to five one hour lessons to allow for deeper learning and more time for the key subjects of English and Maths. The curriculum has been extended to offer greater breadth in the core subjects and discrete sessions in Life Skills (which focuses on careers education, personal, social awareness and healthy lifestyles). Whilst the start and finish times will remain unchanged, the movement time between lessons will be reduced, maximising learning time. In addition, the structure of the school day will increase the form time at the start of the day, helping to improve students' readiness for learning.

Over the final week of the year, your child will attend an assembly to support them to understand some changes that will be made to our behaviour system and the school's 'Standards for Success'. We have spent a significant amount of time reviewing other schools locally and nationally, and how they have addressed behaviour and standards. We believe that, by making small changes to our existing systems for September, we are best placed to support our students to be successful learners.

Outlined below are the key changes that have been made to our 'Standards for Success' from September:

1. We are committed to recognising students who go 'above and beyond' in terms of their learning, through a process of

positive recognition. Students will be awarded E-praise points for going 'above and beyond' in lessons and around the school. In addition, we will communicate with parents on a regular basis when we believe students deserve recognition.

2. We are committed to reviewing our existing rewards programme with students from September to ensure it is fit for purpose and acts as a motivator for effective learning. As such, student voice panels will be set up when we return in September to explore potential developments in this area.
3. From September, we will be using a reviewed consequence system (please see the revised behaviour policy on the school website). Students who continue to fail to meet expectations during lesson time will be removed from the lesson and receive an appropriate sanction.
4. It is our expectation that all students will come to school each day fully prepared for learning: this will include having all the correct equipment with them, including their school planner.
5. We have reviewed our uniform policy and, whilst this remains unchanged, we have been very specific in our descriptions to ensure parents are supported to make the correct purchases over the summer period. We appreciate how stressful this can be and want to ensure that students begin next year with the correct uniform and footwear (black leather shoes not trainers). Additionally, we have worked with students to remind them of how we expect the school uniform to be worn (please see the school website for full details).
6. The introduction of a 'Conduct Card' in September will give the opportunity for students to be rewarded for positive behaviour outside of the classroom. It will also record instances of negative behaviour. Where students choose not to comply with our expectations, they will be issued with a detention for the following afternoon for 30 minutes.

In order to support students and parents with the changes to our Behaviour Policy next academic year, we have put several things in place:

1. Students will have the new 'Standards for Success' shared with them in an assembly prior to the summer holiday.
2. Our website will detail the full 'Standards for Success' and uniform guidance for parents to access.
3. Students will revisit the 'Standards for Success' in assemblies in September and then across the course of the next academic year.
4. Students will be supported via their form learning time and form tutor to ensure they are fully compliant with the 'Standards for Success' at the start of each day and are able to focus on their learning.

Thank you in anticipation of your support in relation to these improvements. We believe that by making these changes we can support teachers and students to engage in conversations that focus upon learning and progress, and not compliance with standards, that in most schools and work places are basic expectations.



Work has finally begun on a classroom extension to the main school building, beyond the existing Design Technology area. This is due for completion in January 2019. On 20th July, work will begin around the main school car park and main vehicular entrance from Sandygate. As a result of this work, access to the school will be via the bus turning circle during the summer holiday.

As we approach the summer holiday, please note our end of term arrangements and some other key dates and information for the next academic year.

End of Term Arrangements (Thursday 19th July 2018)

The school will close on Thursday 19th July at 12.20pm and packed lunches will be available from Le Rendezvous for students who are entitled to a free lunch. Please note that these must be pre-ordered.

First Day Arrangements (Tuesday 4th September 2018)

The school will open to new Year 7 students on Tuesday 4th September at 8.20am. All Year 7 students will meet in the same area as they did when they arrived for their induction days - the playground at the back of the school, located between the dining area and youth centre.

Students in Year 12 should arrive at school for 8.30am.

Students in Years 8-11 & Year 13 should arrive at 9.50am and go to their tutor bases. We would ask that you ensure that your son/daughter does not arrive on site before 9.45am.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support of the school as we work together to ensure the best education for all our children and young people both now and in the future.

From Wath Comprehensive to Texas: Year 7 journalist Cadence Taylor interviews her older sister Mya, who has just left our school sixth form, heading for the States to attend university on a sports scholarship.

Q. Where is the university you will be going to?

A. I was in talks with six universities but in the end chose Lamar University, which is in a little town called Beaumont, just outside Houston Texas.

Q. What are you going to the university for?

A. I'm going on a full ride sports scholarship for Athletics and Cross Country: basically, the university pays all my fees, including living costs, and the team is sponsored by Nike so I get all my kit for free. I just have to train, compete and study.

Q. Why are you going a year early?

A. The early offer came around because I was ranked 9th in the entire UK for 3000m in 2017; I sat the USA Level equivalent exam (SAT) in December and got the entry standard so was able to go.

Q. What will you be doing alongside running?

A. I'll be studying psychology and hopefully getting to travel around the USA in the holidays and during competition.

Q. Are you nervous to be going so far away from home at a young age?

A. I'm a little nervous but I'm mostly excited for the opportunities and experiences I'll gain in the next four years.

Q. What will you miss most about the school?

A. I've been at Wath since I was 11. Of course I'll miss my friends and the support I've had from teachers for my running has been brilliant and being allowed time off to compete in the English Schools and National Cross Country has helped get me to this point so I'm really thankful to the school for that. I'm also really thankful for the help from the Exams Office as I had to provide lots of paperwork and reports for the US college system which they helped with; they honestly made the whole process much easier.

Thanks, Mya. It just shows with hard work and great support from school you can go anywhere you want and I'm sure lots of people will miss you around the place.

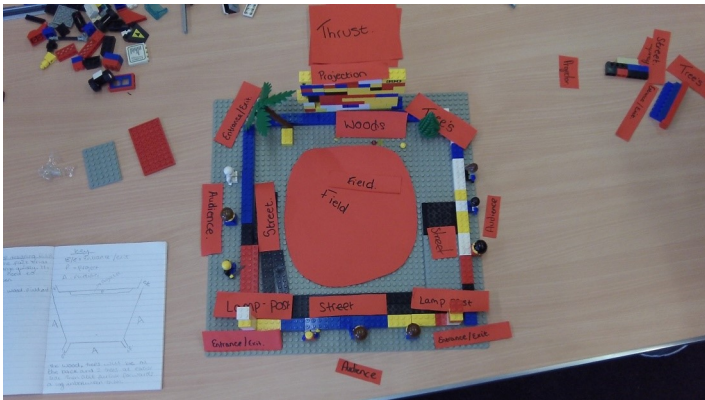

We are incredibly proud of these students for their conduct and superb mathematical skills demonstrated throughout the day.



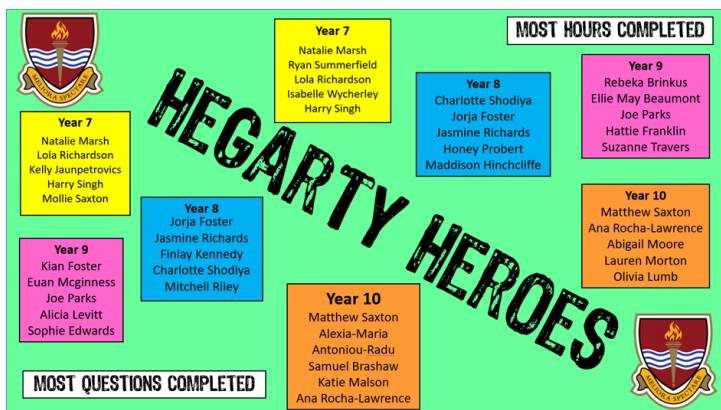

Hegarty Heroes

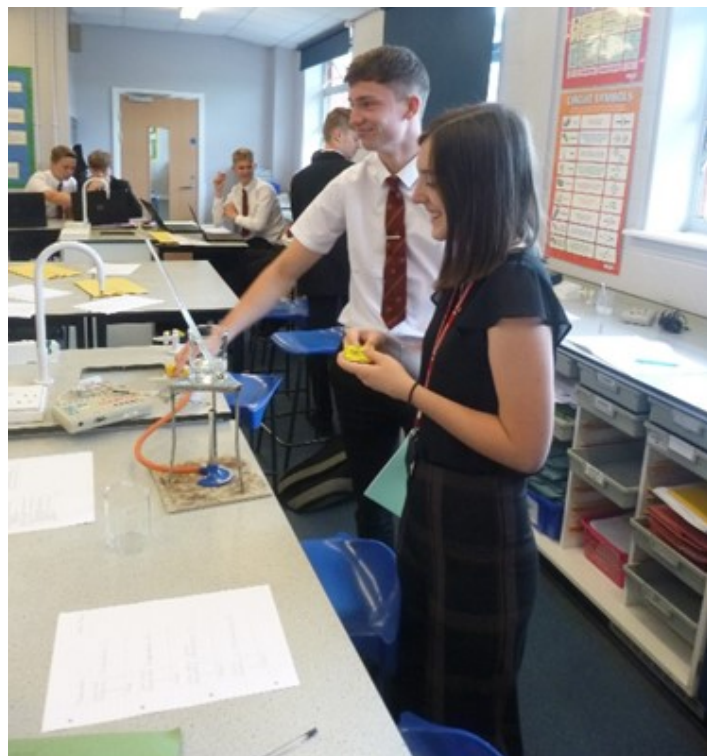

London Bloodbath

Over the past few weeks, London has been hit with a giant crime wave. Two boys were shot in the head in broad daylight on 6th May, while another man had been shot the day before. On May 7th, a teenager was stabbed in Leytonstone, east London. He is thought to be 17 and was rushed to the hospital but thankfully without life-threatening injuries.

On May 9th, just two days after the last attack, a man in his 40s suffered multiple stab wounds after an attack in Shepherd's Bush in West London. He was taken to the hospital and thankfully his injuries also were not life threatening. In the 48 hours before the man got stabbed, a teenager was stabbed on Monday afternoon; a teenager was stabbed in Hackney following a "mass brawl" between youths armed with machetes; a 16-year-old was knifed in the street in Twickenham; a teenage victim was rushed to hospital with stab wounds after reports of a fight in Woolwich and a woman was taken to hospital after a suspected acid attack in Brixton. A day later, a man was rushed to the hospital after suffering multiple stab wounds in an attack in Wanstead, north east London. His injuries thankfully aren't life-threatening either.

On May 16th, a young man was left fighting for his life after being stabbed multiple times in a brutal attack on a west London street. He is believed to be in his 20s and he is still fighting for his life. On May 22nd, a man was stabbed to death in Islington in a horrifying broad daylight attack. He was pronounced dead at the scene. A 44-year old man has been charged for his murder.

These attacks didn't stop there. On May 29th, three

teenage boys were stabbed in a space of a few hours across the capital. One 14 year old was found with knife injuries, an hour later another boy was stabbed and then a 15 year old was found with knife injuries to his chest. Their conditions were not life-threatening and no arrests have been made. Elsewhere in Chelsea on the same day, a man was stabbed to death.

These attacks are still continuing. On June 2nd, a 22 year old man was also left fighting for his life after being found suffering from multiple stab wounds. No arrests have been made for this attack either. On June 3rd, a 17 year old was stabbed to death in Ipswich and detectives arrested a 41 year old man. On June 5th, things worsened deeply. A baby and its mother were found stabbed in their house. The baby is in a critical condition. The woman is in her 30s and the baby is only one year old. Police announced a manhunt for the man who lived at the address and no arrests have been made so far.

Sadiq Khan, the Mayor of London, has been asked if he will put the armed forces onto the streets to stop this rise in crime. The mayor said that there is a protocol in place if there is a terrorist attack that the army will come onto the streets but they won't if it isn't terror related. A lot of the public are wanting more police on the streets and are wanting some to be armed in certain places as some fear it will soon become too dangerous to go outside.

***Love, Simon* Was Just Banned In India**

Love, Simon was the first queer teen film released by a major studio, making a turning point for LGBTQ+, especially for young, queer people.

According to the box office, it raised \$57.5 million so far, after an initial \$17 million production and marketing budget.

Unfortunately, not all countries have been as tolerant towards the LGBTQ+ message of the film. As reported by *Gay Star News*, the Indian Central Board of Film Certification (CBFC) has reportedly banned *Love, Simon* for its depiction of gay relationships.

"India is considered as a progressive country but still hasn't scheduled the release of *Love, Simon* in the cinemas despite the movie being released in majority of the countries," the author of the petition writes. "It's been more than 2 months and the LGBTQ+ community has been patiently waiting for the movie which finally gives the community some representation.

"India has lacked a mainstream powerful representation of its LGBTQ+ citizens for a long time. Although not Bollywood, this film could not only encourage LGBT kids

to come out, but also educate parents about what it means to be gay, lesbian, bisexual etc. This film could have a tremendous impact on the country's perception of what it means to be a part of the LGBT+ community."

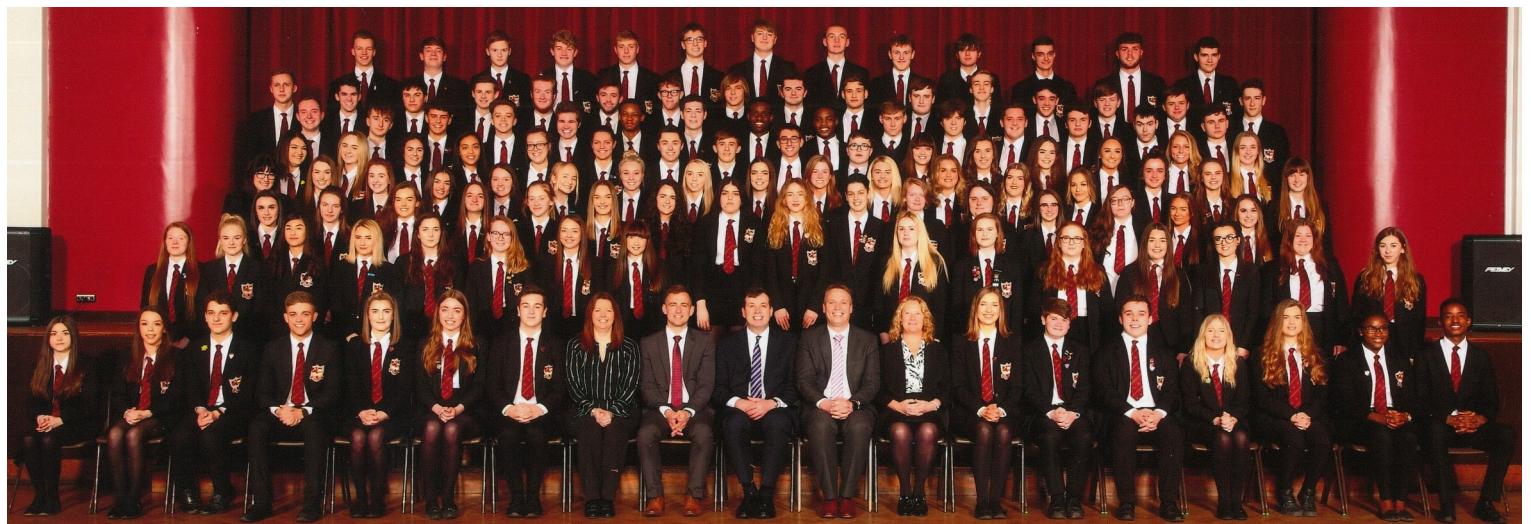

We all know that Russia is the host country for the tournament this year, but do you know exactly where it has taken place? 12 stadiums across 11 cities will host the 64 matches. Also, there was one stadium outside of mainland Russia in the Russian exclave of Kaliningrad, situated between Poland and Lithuania. The first and last matches of the tournaments were held in the Luzhniki stadium which is located in Moscow.

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
Costa only slowed Portugal, who regained their lead right before half time, but there must have been a convincing team talk from Fernando Hierro, the Spain manager, at half time, as they equalised again ten minutes into the second half and three minutes later gained a lead. This lasted until the 88th minute, where Portugal won a free kick just outside the penalty area. Cristiano Ronaldo, who already had two goals in the game, unleashed a lethal free kick to secure a point for Portugal and complete his hat-trick. The two sides went on to finish first and second, with Spain finishing top on goals scored.

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In Group C, France didn't look great, but they still managed to top the group with 7 points; they won their first game against Australia thanks to a late penalty and only won 1-0 against South American side, Peru. In the final game of the group, the eventual winners and runners up were stuck in stalemate with a one-a-piece draw.

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With Argentina sharing the points with Iceland, who were making their World Cup debut, in their first game, they went into their second match up of Group D against Croatia desperate for all three points. It wasn't to be, and Argentina were left in a

seemingly unfavourable position after losing 3-0. Next, they took on Nigeria, who had looked like a side that could pull a few surprises at the World Cup and after winning against Iceland. However, after 14 minutes, Messi took a fantastic touch to control and placed the ball into the top corner, scoring his first goal of the tournament. Despite an equaliser five min later, another late goal (this time Manchester United defender Marcos Rojo) allowed Argentina to win and steal a spot as runners up of group D, behind Croatia who won all their games.

Elsewhere, in Group E, previous hosts of the tournament Brazil were looking to bounce back from their last World Cup match, a humiliating 7-1 loss to Germany in the semi-finals of their own tournament. Despite this desire to win, they only took 1 point from their first game, drawing 1-1 with Switzerland. These two teams shared the points and also both went through to the knockouts with Brazil winning their other two games and Switzerland winning one and drawing another.

Current champions Germany, who entered as favourites to win, looked set to top Group F. However, this is the World Cup and anything can happen! The four-time champions took a shock defeat to a spirited Mexico side, losing 1-0.

Germany needed a win to stay in the tournament and in their way was Sweden, who looked set to win when they took the lead in the 32nd minute. Just after half time, Germany equalized through Marco Reus and, deep into the five minutes of added time, agonizingly scored a winner: a sweetly taken strike from Tony Kroos, following a free kick, restored hope for Germany. However, South Korea went on to thrash Germany 2-0 in their last game, sending them home after a measly three games, not even making it out of the groups! Mexico and Sweden went through on a joint six points.

In the final group, Group H, Japan and Colombia also progressed to the next stage, taking out Senegal and Poland. Columbia ended up as group leaders with 6 points, and but their good run ended in the quarter finals when England took them out on penalties, with a 4-3 final score.

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The World Cup final took place on Sunday 15th, where France secured the golden trophy in a 4-2 victory against a determined Croatia, who battled to the very end.
