From the Archives

Each edition of *Torch*, we reprint an article from Wath Academy's extensive collection of old school magazines (available online at wathacademy.com/torch). In early 1974, a strike by miners meant businesses were limited to using electricity for just three days a week. At the height of this energy crisis, students in the 4th Year (Year 10) surveyed Wath locals to discover their views.



4th Year Current Affairs Public Opinion Survey (1974)

s a 4th year Current Affairs group, we carried out a survey of public opinion on the present crisis. The survey involved 75 people who we later divided into 5 groups using the Registrar-General's official classification of socio-economic status. We asked people to give their opinions on which jobs they considered contributed most to the national prosperity and what jobs they thought to be the highest paid at the moment. Other questions enquired about prices in the shops, the value of pensions and whether a General Election should take place.

The first question listed 10 different jobs and the public was asked which of these helped most towards national prosperity. The results were as follows: most people thought that the miners contributed most and almost everybody agreed that entertainers contributed least. The dockers and the ambulance men were thought to be in the middle.

The second question dealt with the highest paid jobs at the moment. The entertainers were rated the highest paid and the lowest paid were thought to be the nurses. The results showed that people were undecided about the miners' pay. We came to the conclusion that people thought that although the

entertainers contributed least to national prosperity, they were the highest paid.

Question 3 dealt with what affected prices in the shops and the results were that most people thought that world prices had the most effect on prices in the shops. This shows that most people believed the Conservatives in their election campaign when they said that world prices had caused the price increases in Britain. Out of 5 different classes of people we interviewed, 4 classes thought that profits and dividends had the least effect on the price increases. The third class (skilled workers) thought that wages had the least effect on prices.

Question 4 dealt with whether people felt that pensions bought more today than they did in 1954 and 1964 and most people agreed that pensions bought less today than in previous years.


The last question asked whether people thought there should be a general election at the present time. The result was that the majority of people asked said that there should be.

Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children by Ransom Riggs

Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children is the first book in a six-book series by Ransom Riggs.


The first book focuses on the shy, social outcast, sixteen-year-old protagonist, Jacob Portman. As a child, his grandfather shared anecdotes of his own childhood in the form of bedtime stories. He shared stories of children with peculiar traits such as a girl who could float, and a boy that was completely invisible. He claimed that they all lived together in a children's home in the 1940s in Cairnholm, Wales. Jacob was fully convinced of his grandfather's words, but as he aged he became sceptical of his grandfather's tall tales.

The book follows Jacob in the aftermath of his grandfather's death on a quest to see for himself if the stories were fabricated or could potentially have some truth behind them. He travels to Wales from America to explore the island his grandfather grew up on to see if the children's home may reveal some truths to him.

In my opinion, this book is the perfect introduction to the *Miss Peregrine* series and helps build both the world and characters perfectly. The writing quality is excellent and kept me engaged throughout.

I originally read this book in Year 3 but revisited it almost a decade later to find the book oozing with nostalgia and it holds a special place in my heart for being the first book I read that was over 100 pages long.

Despite this book being so well written, I would argue that it isn't the best one in the series, as that title belongs to *Hollow City* (the second book), which is easily my personal favourite.

book. To keep this spoiler free, I will just say that the ending was truly captivating and made me want to read the next novel in the series, *The Shadow of Kyoshi*.


There are also other novels developed by the creators of Avatar following other avatars' stories such as Yangchen and Roku. Throughout The Rise of Kyoshi, the

This song was made by the Arctic Monkeys frontman Alex Turner and fellow musician Miles Kane as their supergroup The


Last Shadow Puppets. The song shows their individual talents away from a band and allows them to explore a new genre, opening to a smaller but different audience than their typical work.


