Lifestyle is a project that is run by South Yorkshire Police for pupils of school age. It aims to engage pupils in Crime Prevention Initiatives on issues that they feel are of particular importance to them. The pupils are encouraged to form a group of no more than six and to nominate an adult

leader of their choice to help them develop and deliver their work to the local community. Entrants have to evidence their work in a portfolio, which is then entered into a competition and the winning group can win £500 each in Meadowhall vouchers. The runners up win £250 and £150 respectively.

The pupils have been helped by PC White to enter the competition and you may well have heard about them in the local press such as The Barnsley Chronicle newspaper or on Radio Dearne FM. Year 8 pupils Paige Fitzpatrick, Joy Lord, Chelsea Carty, Shona Hayes-Mackenzie and Amy Keeton are campaigning to have CCTV cameras positioned in Holly Bush Park in Brampton to prevent vandalism and anti social behaviour. Neighbourhood Team.

It was very useful as it taught the girls exactly what to do and who to contact if they ever had any problems with strangers on the net. The most active part of the morning involved a fitness workshop. To begin with the girls watched a video about the importance of healthy eating. They were split into two groups. Other workshops/displays included information on topics such as stress, fire safety, breast-feeding and the students were free to wander and collect information/leaflets. The information collected may be of use as part of their coursework next year.

STEINWAY PIANO

As you are aware from previous issues of 'In Touch' with the help of Friends of Wath we are continuing to look at ways of raising money to restore our 70 year old Steinway piano. The much loved piano arrived at Wath



in 1953, 14 years after it was made. Since then it has played a vital role in both musical and drama productions as well as supporting students in assemblies and lessons.

The restoration is expected to cost between £8 000 and £12 000 which will enable future generations to enjoy it for a further 70 years. To replace it would cost £30 000. Already the project has received funding from Wombwell Rotary Club, the Druids Sheffield Friendly Society and Friends of Wath as well as the school.



The afternoon was given over to an Arena event. This included:



Results will be published by the end of term and three grades of certificate are awarded: Pass, Merit and Distinction. Results from the computer part of the test suggest that there are many close to the merit already.



WIGS (Wath Improving Grades) is part of the Assertive Mentoring Scheme for Y11. It involves a variety of activities throughout the year aimed at improving attainment. 

I feel the students have benefited enormously from this and plans are already in motion for next year's cohort.


